Annual big trip: Porto

On March 21 it was finally time to leave for the annual big trip. After a great trip to Berlin last year, this year's travel committee decided to go more south; to the beautiful city of Porto. 26 Dondrites (including one Portuguese Donders PhD student) were ready for five days of tours through labs and bars in Portugal's second largest city.

Being used to Dutch spring, 22 degrees, sun and glorious blue sky did sound pretty decent to us. We arrived in Porto in the late afternoon, and directly got to check out the amazing Happy Porto Hostel. For dinner, as on pretty much all days, we went to have either seafood or Francesinha - a traditional Portuguese

sandwich which includes a lot of bread, a lot of meat, a lot of sauce, and sometimes some veggies. It is traditionally served with an egg on top and french fries. Our Portuguese PhD student called it *the Portuguese heart attack on a plate* and to us that seemed quite accurate.

The first night ended shortly after dinner as we needed to get up early the next morning for the academic part of the trip: the lab tours! We visited three labs: the sex lab, the addiction lab and the nerve regeneration lab. For the latter two, you can go check out the website of the i3s institute of the University of Porto (<https://www.i3s.up.pt/>). We learned a lot about the theory behind the studies that are

conducted in these labs and also got a tour of their facilities.

The next two days were filled with sightseeing, ice cream, beach walks, swimming, soccer matches, karaoke and - of course - some partying. For the fourth day, the travel committee had organized a winery tour for us. We learned a lot about the process of making the famous port wine and afterwards obviously had to verify the quality of the wine ;-). As this

already marked the last night of the trip, we met up for a big joint dinner and enjoyed the last night as a group.

The next day we returned to Nijmegen safe and sound but the trip remained a subject of conversation for way longer.

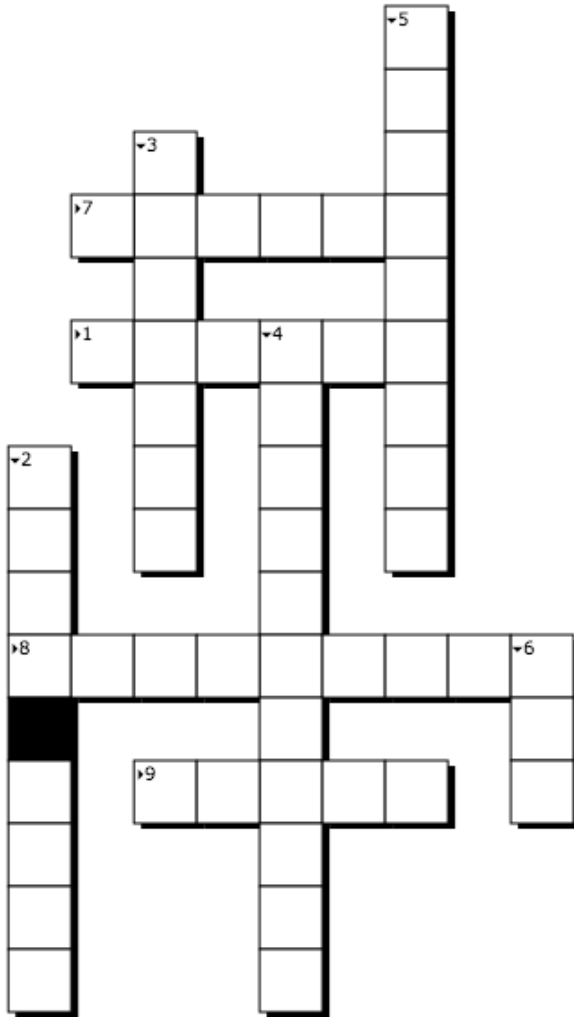
Fun Fact

still successfully graduate with an MA in history, and he also speaks five languages.

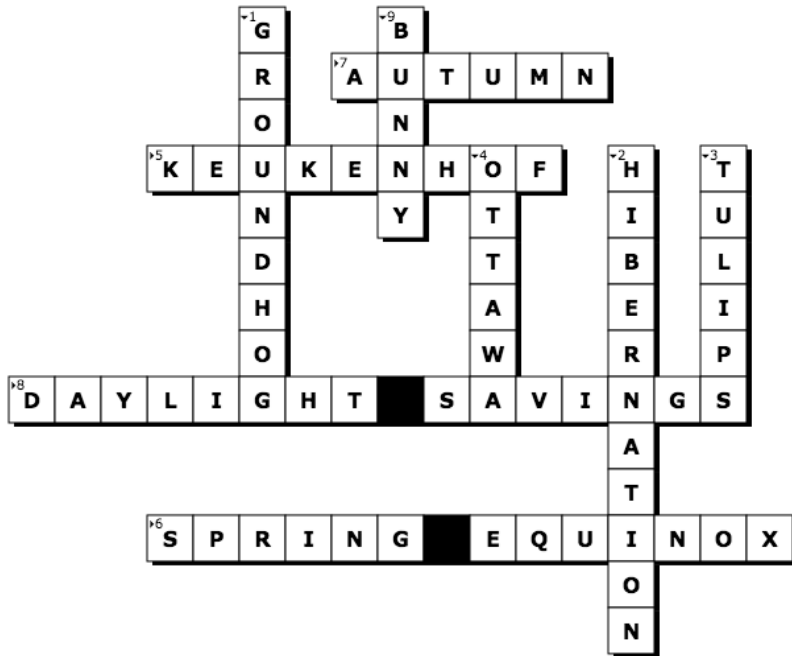


Crossword
