What the heck is Sinterklaas?

In case you just moved to the Netherlands this year, you might be wondering what that Sinterklaas event is that everybody increasingly talks about.

December 6th is the name day of Saint Nicholas, a Christian bishop who was known for his generosity and altruism. To honor him, there are Saint Nicholas celebrations in most Christian countries all over the world on December 6. The Dutch - clever as they are - start celebrating earlier than that, with their main celebration being Sinterklaasavond (Sinterklaas Eve) on December 5.

Sinterklaas, portrayed as an elderly man with white hair and a long, full beard, traditionally

carries a big red book with him in which it is written whether each child has been good or naughty in the past year. He is accompanied by his assistant, the Zwarte Piet (Black Pete). Whether the depiction of Piet is racist and should be changed is an ongoing discussion.

On the evening before Sinterklaasavond children traditionally put their shoes next to the fireplace or the door and leave little notes for Sinterklaas and/or some carrots for his horse. In the morning, they find their presents and thank Sinterklaas for them. In this way, it also teaches children that being kind is rewarded and valued. Sinterklaas has developed to be the main gift-giving event in the Netherlands.

Fun Fact




Cultures collide in this edition of the DondriteNews Crossword. Put your Sinterklaas/Santa Claus knowledge to the test
